## **Lieutenant David M. Yingling Graduates Johns Hopkins University**

On May 27, 2010 Lieutenant David M. Yingling received his Master of Science Degree from Johns Hopkins University. For the past eighteen months Lieutenant Yingling has participated in Johns Hopkins Police Executive Leadership Program (PELP).

"Johns Hopkins PELP Program is an intense course of study for public safety executives leading to a graduate degree in management. This award-winning program has been cited as one of the premier public safety executive education programs in the nation. Currently in its fifteenth year, the program remains the flagship program for the division and serves as the model for all division programs. The curriculum consists of 15 three-credit courses covering areas including leadership, change management, building quality organizations, management decision-making and ethics and integrity." Lieutenant Yingling is a twelve-year veteran of the St. Mary's County Sheriff's Office and is currently assigned to the St. Mary's County Bureau of Criminal Investigation. He holds a Bachelor of Arts degree in Economics from St. Mary's College and, now, a newly-bestowed Master of Science in Management degree from Johns Hopkins University.

The Yinglings had to cope with rotating shift schedules, work responsibilities and many hours of homework but they still managed to find quality family time together.
